Both Judaism and Catholicism in America have a long, complex and intertwined history. In the British colonies, prior to the Revolution both groups were relatively small, minority traditions. Subsequently, both played a major role in defining and broadening the American concept of freedom of religion. With massive immigration in the 19th century, discrimination against both Jews and Catholics rose while at the same time, the two groups also increasingly collided with one another. In recent years, official Jewish-Catholic relations have improved significantly while at the same time the rate of mixed marriage between the two has also increased. Please join us for Rabbi Sussman's intriguing, comparative discussion of Judaism and Catholicism in the United States.



Lance J. Sussman, Ph.D., is the Senior Rabbi of Reform Congregation Keneseth Israel in Elkins Park, PA, and Adjunct Professor of American Jewish History at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion-New York. He is the author of numerous books and articles including Isaac Leeser and the Making of American Judaism and Sharing Sacred Moments, a collection of his sermons. An editor of Reform Judaism in America: A Biographical Dictionary and Source Book, Rabbi Sussman is a member of the Academic Advisory and Editorial Board of the American Jewish Archives (Cincinnati) and past chair of the Judaic Studies Department at Binghamton University. Rabbi Sussman has taught at Princeton, Rutgers and Hunter College. Currently he is working on a TV documentary on the Philadelphia Jewish experience with History Making Productions.
